Bishop's Panel on Housing Justice

Municipal Elections in Ontario • October 26, 2026

Homelessness in the Anglican Diocese has reached record highs, driven by rapid population growth, inflation and a severe shortage of affordable housing.

Facts to know:

- **Over 3,000 people are homeless in Ottawa** on any given night, including over **1200 children** living with their families in emergency shelters or temporary motels. Hundreds are living unsheltered or in encampments.
- Homelessness is also a problem in **rural areas of Ontario**, where **it jumped 30% between 2024 and 2025**.
- Approximately **16,000 people** are on Ottawa's centralized waiting list for affordable housing.
- **Indigenous people** make up a disproportionately high percentage of the homeless population.

What can municipal councils do:

- Ensure affordable housing and homelessness are municipal priorities, supported by appropriate levels of funding.
- Advocate for increased housing funding from provincial and federal governments and fast track more deeply affordable and supportive housing.
- Create bylaws to reduce evictions resulting from renovations and demolitions.
- Create an acquisition strategy to assist non-profit housing groups to purchase existing buildings that can be converted to affordable rental housing.

What you can ask your municipal candidates:

- Will you make ending homelessness and building more affordable housing a priority if you are elected?
- Will you advocate to prevent the loss of affordable rental housing and essential community supports for homeless people, and the creation of new housing for the most vulnerable?
- Will you advocate for an increase to municipal funding for affordable housing even if it means an increase in property taxes?
